Specifically, the Executive Branch needs to follow Congress's longstanding instruction to offset discretionary increases in direct spending. The Strengthening Administrative PAYGO Act of 2024 would help to ensure that longstanding instruction is carried out by Federal departments and agencies.

With the nation quickly running out of fiscal space, we simply cannot allow meaningful spending restraints like Administrative PAYGO to be disregarded. Thank you for your thoughtful leadership on this issue of vital national importance.
