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H.R. 7032, THE CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE DATA SHARING ACT

The **Congressional Budget Office (CBO)** is tasked with providing Congress budgetary analyses on the impact of legislation considered by the United States Congress.

THE PROBLEM

Despite the data access authority granted to CBO under the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, CBO encounters **ongoing challenges in accessing necessary data** from executive branch agencies promptly and without restrictions.

These constraints *delay critically important*, *comprehensive budget analyses* and *economic forecasting*, hindering lawmakers' ability to make informed decisions regarding the *fiscal impact* of prospective legislation.

THE SOLUTION: *H.R. 7032, THE CBO DATA SHARING ACT*

Maintains Confidentiality by expanding access to data, this bill protects sensitive information by maintaining legal confidentiality protections.

Clarifies CBO Authority by amending existing law to clarify and expand the CBO Director's authority to request and receive data from executive branch agencies.

Safeguards Legislative Intent through an included provision that prevents future laws from limiting or modifying CBO's enhanced data acquisition authority unless explicitly stated.

Implements New Reporting Requirement which mandates that CBO submit a report to the Budget Committees, both in the House and Senate, that details requests made under this new authority and any challenges encountered within a year of the bill's enactment.

THE NEED FOR REFORM: CBO's Ability to Access Agency Data



FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY

- Previous efforts by CBO to better evaluate the fiscal impact of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) have **encountered significant delays** due to layers of federal bureaucracy within the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).
- Despite FEMA's expressed desire to cooperate with CBO in providing critically important census data, concerns about FEMA's **legal authority to share the required data** prolonged programmatic funding negotiations.

This situation exemplifies the type of bureaucratic entanglement that <u>H.R 7032, the CBO Data Sharing Act</u> seeks to eliminate.

By **clarifying** and **codifying** CBO's authority to access data from federal agencies, the bill would alleviate FEMA's concerns, ensuring that similar cooperative efforts are not hamstrung by legal ambiguity.

SOCIAL SECURITY ADMINISTRATION

- CBO's historically fraught interactions with the Social Security Administration (SSA) best exemplifies the systemic challenges caused by ill-defined intergovernmental information sharing practices.
- The process of **renewing data sharing agreements**, a vital practice needed for the development of CBO's legislative cost analyses, have been met with **persistent delays from SSA**.
- One particular data sharing agreement with the SSA required *over a year of negotiations* to secure its approval.
- CBO's inability to access up-to-date SSA collected data highlights a broader challenge where *differing interpretations of legislative mandates*, such as the Privacy Act versus the Budget Act, increase *inefficiencies* and *obstacles* to data access and, by extension, delays the subsequent legislative process.

H.R 7032, the CBO Data Sharing Act streamlines existing mandates by specifying and expanding the CBO Director's authority to request and receive data from executive branch agencies, like the SSA.
